

## **Fun Facts**

- (R) Did you know why the Eloise Staudinger archway was dedicated to her? Eloise Staudinger was the founder of the Colony Shop and the Beautification Committee for the Greater Patchogue Chamber of Commerce. The Colony Shop was opened in Patchogue in 1946 and is still serving local families today.
- (T) What is now known as the Patchogue Theater was originally Ward & Glynne's Theater which opened in 1923. After the Depression the theater became a movie theater. The Patchogue Village Board purchased the theater in 1997 in an effort to revitalize downtown Patchogue.
- (K) Duke was a dog that a policeman saved from drowning in a cesspool and then he became like the unofficial mascot of the police force of Patchogue in the 40s and 50s. He would ride in the sidecar of police motorcycles. When Duke passed away in 1954, after living a long and happy life, the Patchogue PBA honored him with a plaque right on the four corners of Main Street, where it still stands today. The inscription reads: "Just a dog, but a four-legged legend on four corners."
